In the bee yard:

- The queen's egg laying will slow this month and hive population will begin to drop – especially drones.
- Some areas may be experiencing a fall honey flow now. Sunshine with an
 occasional rain and cool nights helps the nectar to flow in flowering plants
 such as the goldenrod and aster. This is a great time for your bees to build
 up their winter stores. Keep a check on hive weight.
- If you are not experiencing a fall flow and your hives are light, feed sugar syrup inside the hive in a 2:1 ratio (5 lbs. sugar to 5 cups water) to ensure hives have adequate winter stores. Each gallon of syrup fed to the bees increases their reserves by about seven pounds. Do not use entrance feeders at this time of year due to potential robbing.
- Reduce entrances down to a small opening (3/4") to help the colony guard against robbing. The reducer cleat should be placed with the entrance up rather than down to prevent blockage by dead bees or debris during winter.
- If you use multiple deep or medium hive bodies for your brood chambers, rotate them, if needed, to place the brood on the bottom and honey stores on the top. Bees tend to move up in the hive during winter.
- Remove gueen excluders between the colony and its winter stores.
- Only strong colonies should be overwintered. If you are going to combine
 weak colonies with strong colonies, do it now to allow time for the bees to
 arrange their brood nest and honey stores before winter.

2017 Beehive Grant

The North Carolina Agricultural Development and Farmland Preservation Trust Fund plans to provide money in 2018 to selected NCSBA Certified Beekeepers who purchase new hive materials.

- \$200/hive up to \$2,400 total awarded to each grantee from February 1 to June 30, 2018 in 2018 until the fund is depleted.

- To be considered for the grant money, you must apply beginning in October.

If you are a beekeeper with at least 4 months experience, there still may be enough time to take the written and practical exams to become a NCSBA Certified Beekeeper and be eligible for the grant. You will need your certificate to apply for the grant.
