#### <u>News</u>:

In April, the Bee Informed Partnership conducted their 10<sup>th</sup> annual national survey of honey bee colony losses. Preliminary analysis of the responses show an estimated **28.1%** of the colonies managed in the United States were lost over the 2015-2016 winter - an increase of 5.8% compared to last winter, but close to the 10-year average of 28.6%. Taking summer losses into account, beekeepers lost **44.1%** of their colonies between April 2015 and March 2016. This high rate of loss is close to the highest annual loss rate over the 6 years that Bee Informed Partnership has collected annual colony loss numbers. # In the bee yard:

- Spring nectar (honey) flow is winding down and normally ends in our area late May to early June.
- Monitor your honey supers. Ensure your bees have empty comb to store nectar in supers until the honey flow has ended. Remove and extract capped supers from your colonies if you need additional supers.
- It is time to add another super when the super on a colony is one-half to two-thirds filled (six to seven frames). Raise the partially filled super and place the empty super under it.
- When you decide to harvest, ensure the honey in the comb is more than three quarters capped (preferably fully capped) to prevent extracting honey with high moisture content. High moisture can lead to fermentation. If unsure, use a honey refractometer.
- Honey bee plants that are flowering now white globe clover, blackberries, magnolias, rabbitfoot clover, and many others!
- Do not use medications in a colony with supers that are to be used to extract honey for human consumption [exception: Mite Away Quick Strips™ (formic acid) is reported that it can be used in the hive while honey supers are on].
- Prop up one end of the outer (top) cover to improve airflow during hot weather. Good air circulation improves both honey production and hive health.
